Tests applied by those seeking to recognize a book as inspired by God, were as follows:

## **Old Testament - tests of Canonicity**

Authoritative Test: Does the book display the authority or power of God, through the words, events, or

deeds that it recorded?

Authorship Test: Was the book written or endorsed by one, who was recognized or confirmed, as a

servant of God?

**Authentic Test:** Does the book have any provable errors? Is the book consistent with the other

accepted books?

**Power Test:** Do the words of the book display the life-changing power of God? Do the words of the

book edify, build-up, or bless the reader?

**Receptive Test:** Have people in the past received the book as inspired by God? Was the book read at

religious gatherings in the past?

## **New Testament - tests of canonicity**

Authoritative Test: Does the book display the authority or power of God, through the words, events, or

**Apostle of Jesus?**

**Receptive Test:** Have people in the past received the book as inspired by God? Was the book read at

religious gatherings in the past?
